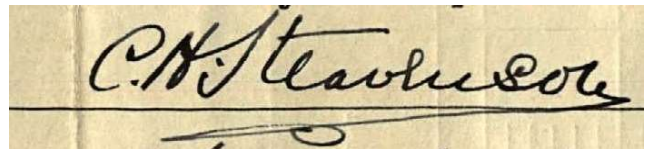

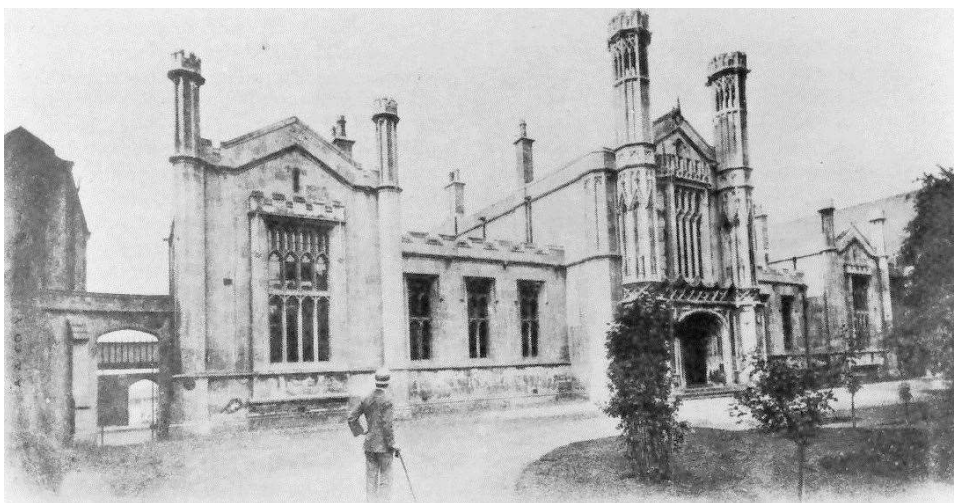


Charles H Steavenson aged 21 taken London

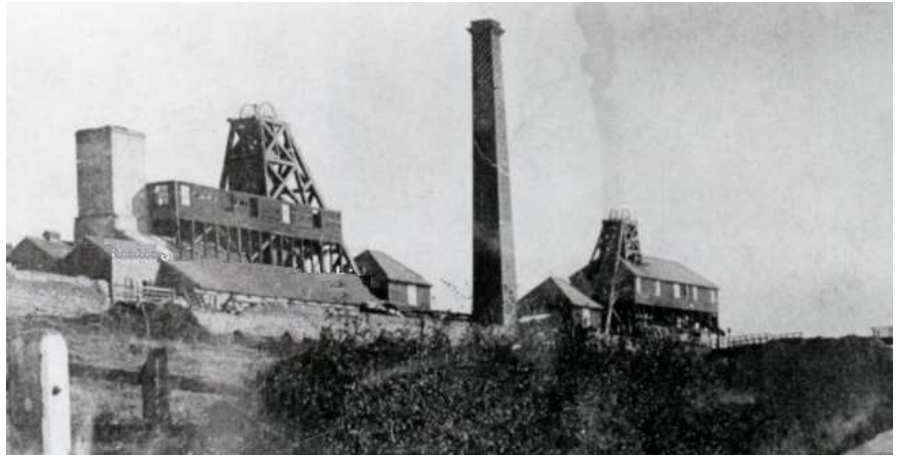

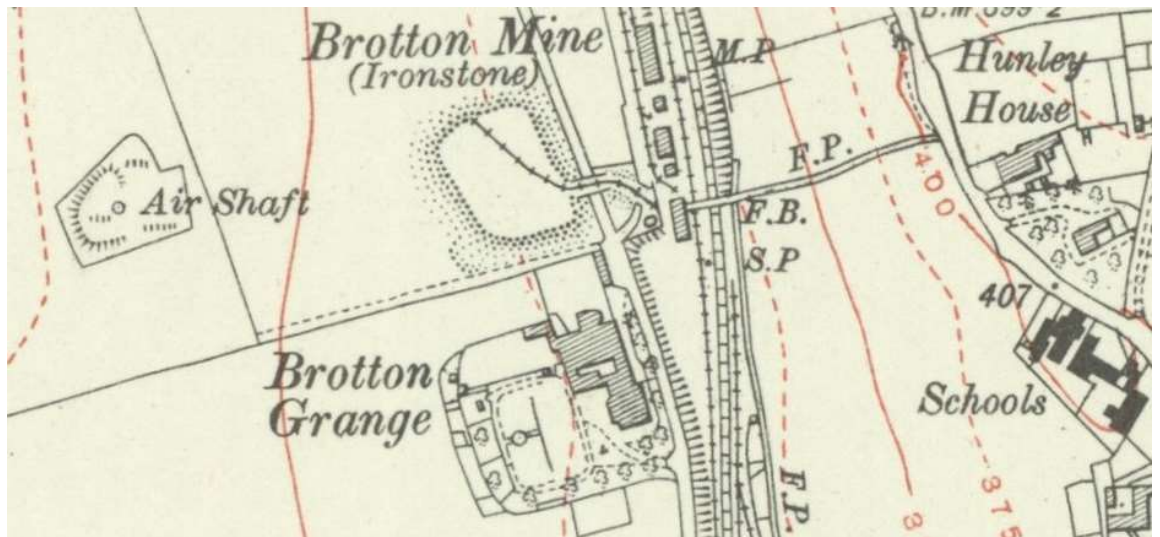

Death of Mr C. H. Steavenson

His many friends in Durham and district will be sorry to learn of the death of Mr C. H. Steavenson, Northfields, Todhills, near Willington, who, for many years resided at The Carrs, Framwellgate Moor. Although Mr Steavenson had been in poor health for some time, the end came rather suddenly. He was 84, and up to about a year ago was very active.

His father, the late Addison Langhorne Steavenson, resided at Holywell Hall, Durham (now the home of Lt.-Col. Sir Cuthbert Headlam, Bart.), and was chief mining engineer to Messrs Bell Bros. for many years. This company was later merged into Dorman, Long and Co., Ltd.

MINING AS A CAREER

Born at Guisborough, Mr Steavenson spent most of his childhood and early manhood at Holywell Hall, Durham. Educated at Aysgarth School and later at St. Peter's, York, he chose mining as a career, and after gaining his manager's certificate, became manager of an ironstone mine in North Yorks.

Then he went to Gateshead where, for many years, he was manager of Redheugh Colliery. This colliery had to close down eventually due to subsidence damaging local property. Mr Steavenson then became manager of Belmont, near Guisbrough, an ironstone mine, where he remained until it was forced to close down due to the General Strike of 1926. He retired and devoted the remainder of his life to his great hobby—art.

He loved painting, chiefly landscapes, and was expert in the use of both oil and water colours. In his younger days his pictures were often to be seen at Northern exhibitions, chiefly at the Laing Art Gallery, Newcastle, and the Shipley Art Gallery, Gateshead. He was a founder-member and was later made an honorary member of Durham and District Artists' Society.

He loved everything that was beautiful—the flowers, birds and trees. Always kind, courteous and thoughtful for others, he was, as one who knew him for many years recently said, “a typical old-English gentleman.” He is survived by his widow, three daughters (all of whom are married), and one son, Mr H. H. Steavenson, who resides at Shincliffe.
